Tippett gets win No. 500

GLENDALE, Ariz. — The Arizona Coyotes grinded their way through the tough stretches, relied on great goaltending and won it on a big goal at the end. Call it a Dave Tippett special. Oliver Ekman-Larsson scored in overtime, Mike Smith stopped 25 shots and the Arizona Coyotes beat the Calgary Flames 2-1 Friday night for coach Tippett's 500th career victory. "I've been involved in a lot of ugly games in that 500, so it's probably fitting that was an ugly game," said Tippett, who has 229 wins with Arizona and the rest with Dallas. It certainly was right out of the Tippett playbook. The Coyotes played a

solid first period and both teams scored goals in the second on caroms: Martin Hanzal early for Arizona, Mark Giordano late on a power play for Calgary. Arizona followed with a series of penalties, but Smith was sharp for the second straight game to send this one to overtime. The Flames had the edge early in the 3-on-3 overtime, leaving the Coyotes gasping for air. Arizona flipped the ice for the final stretch, leaving Calgary's players winded and scrambling. Arizona won it with 39 seconds left on the clock when Brad Richardson sent a pass from behind the goal to Ekman-Larsson, and he one-timed it past Karri Ramos. After the game, the Coyotes handed their championship belt, awarded to the player of the game, to their low-key coach after his

milestone victory. "Coaches don't have many milestones, but that's a big one," Smith said. "Players have milestones all the time, but coaches only have winning, which is all that matters, really." The Flames certainly had their chances to win. Calgary had a rare power-play goal when Giordano scored his fifth of the season, but the Flames failed on five other chances with the man advantage to lose to Arizona for the first time in six games. Ramos stopped 18 in his first loss in five career games against Arizona and the Flames lost for the first time in six 3-on-3 overtimes. "It was a good road game," Flames coach Bob Hartley said. "We played smart, we played hard, it's just the result, we wish we could change it."

Bruins come from behind

Tuukka Rask had 24 saves for the Bruins, who extended their win streak to a season-high five games in a wild finish. Humphries steers to World Cup win

ALTENBERG, Germany — Olympic and world champion Kaillie Humphries of Canada started the bobsled season by winning the first World Cup race on Friday. Humphries and brakewoman Melissa Lotholz was quickest in both runs, clocking 56.77 and 56.90 seconds for a combined time of 1:53.67, and shaving 0.002 seconds off her six-year-old track record. "Overall I'm really happy how it went. We pushed faster

this year than last year, which shows a summer of good training is paying off," said Humphries following her 30th career World Cup podium. "We had two good runs overall, and I'm happy with how I drove today. The new sled is running really well and I hope to continue to build on this momentum for rest of season." Belgium's Elfe Willemsen and Sophie Vercruyssen were next with a time of 1:54.41, followed by Jamie Greubel Poser and Lauren Gibbs of the United States in 1:54.72.

PROTECT WATER LINES FROM FREEZING

The following actions should be considered to protect your water lines.

- Repair broken windows and ensure windows/vents are closed during the winter.
- Insulate water pipes in unheated areas, include crawl spaces.
- For sinks located against a non-insulated outside wall:
 - Open the vanity door to allow warm air to reach the water pipes.
 - A light bulb placed near the water pipe may generate enough heat to keep the water flowing.
 - Heat tape wrapped around the pipe may keep the pipe from freezing.
- For Residents of mobile homes
 - check the condition of the heat tape on their water service and meter
 - protect unheated indoor water meter with an insulated box
 - water pipes should be wrapped in insulation using heat tape
 - Outside water taps and underground sprinkler systems should have the water supply shut off inside the house at the isolation valve for the tap
 - Sprinkler lines and taps should be drained/blown out
- A thin stream of water (as thick as a pencil lead) running continuously from at least one tap will help prevent a frozen water service.
- If you plan to be away from home over the winter period, close the main water isolation valve in your home. This is located next to your water meter.

A frozen water service, or a burst water pipe, is an inconvenience and expense that most people would like to avoid. Please take precautions to prevent this happening in your home or business.
