Federer into 11th Wimbledon final

Roger Federer is here once more, back in a Wimbledon final for the 11th time, back on the verge of an eighth championship at the All England Club, more than any man has collected in the storied, century-plus history of the place.

Nearly 36, and a father of four, Federer continued his resurgent season and unchallenged run through this fortnight by conjuring up just enough brilliance to beat 2010 Wimbledon runner-up Tomas Berdych 7-6 (4), 7-6 (4), 6-4 on Friday.

"Can't almost believe it's true again," Federer said.

He has won every set he's played in this year's tournament and while he did not dominate the semifinal, he was never in much trouble. On Sunday, Federer will face 2014 U.S. Open champion Marin Cilic, who reached his first final at the All England Club by eliminating 24th-seeded Sam Querrey of the U.S. 6-7 (6), 6-4, 7-6 (3), 7-5 with the help of 25 aces and some terrific returning.

Since equaling Pete Sampras and William Renshaw (who played in the 1880s) with a seventh title at Wimbledon in 2012, Federer has come this close before to No. 8. But he lost to Novak Djokovic in the 2014 and 2015 finals.

Now comes another chance. Federer would be the oldest man to win Wimbledon in the Open era, which dates to 1968; as it is, he's the oldest finalist since Ken Rosewall was 39 in 1974.

"This guy doesn't seem like he's getting any older or slowing down," said Berdych, who wore shoes with a silhouette of Djokovic's face on the tongue. "He's just proving his greatness in our sport."

Also noteworthy: This is Federer's second major final of 2017. After taking off the last half of last year while letting a surgically repaired left knee heal, he won the Australian Open in January for his record-extending 18th Grand Slam trophy.

"Giving your body rest from time to time is a good thing, as we see now," Federer said. "And I'm happy it's paying off because for a second, of course, there is doubts there that maybe one day you'll never be able to come back and play a match on Centre Court at Wimbledon."

Canada advances to Gold Cup quarter-finals in scoreless draw against Honduras

Canada has qualified for the quarter-finals of the 2017 Gold Cup after tying Honduras 0-0 on a hot night at Toyota Stadium.

The Canadians will play in Glendale, Ariz., on July 20 against an opponent still to be determined after finishing in second place in Group A.

Marcel de Jong, usually a defender, started in an advanced role on the left side and almost put Canada in front in the 23rd minute.

Junior Hoilett crossed from the right side, it was flicked on by defender Steven Vitoria and the left-footed de Jong

struck his volley right off the post to the right of Honduran goalkeeper Luis Lopez.

Honduras came right back the other way and in the same minute, with forward Ovidio Lanza's header from right in front just missing high over the Canadian goal.

In the 38th minute, Alberth Elis led another Honduran charge down the right side and flashed a shot across the face of goal but out for a Canadian goal kick.

Honduras needed to win to move ahead of Canada in the standings but couldn't make anything of the little openings provided, while the Canadian squad had a few chances at the other end to get a winner.

North American Indigenous Games combines sports with culture

The 2017 North American Indigenous Games are bringing a message of healing to Toronto, not just through participation in sports, but a cultural exchange.

Marcia Trudeau-Bomberry, the CEO of the Games, emphasizes the cultural exchange that will happen not just between Indigenous people and non-Indigenous people, but First Nations from across the continent. That process starts with

Sunday's opening ceremony at the Aviva Centre on York University's campus.

"Reconciliation is a two-way street," Trudeau-Bomberry said Monday. "It's about non-Indigenous people taking that step to learn about Indigenous people, about the culture, about learning about some of the athletes and where they've come from and what they've gone through to make it Toronto."

"Everyone's got a different story to tell, different challenges and different barriers."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE LAND USE BYLAW #4168 521C ALLOWANCE AVENUE SE

TAKE NOTICE that City Council gave First Reading on Tuesday, July 4, 2017 to Bylaw #4439, a Bylaw of the City of Medicine Hat to amend the Land Use Bylaw #4168 to rezone the subject land from Neighbourhood Commercial District (C-N) to Low Density Residential District (R-LD).

The purpose of this Bylaw amendment is to allow the owner to expand the existing single detached house located at 521C Allowance Avenue SE. Under the current zoning of C-N, single detached houses are neither a permitted use, nor a discretionary use, and are considered to be a legal non-conforming use and construction of an addition would not be allowed. Under the previous Land Use Bylaw #3181 the property was zoned Single Family Residential District (R-1). If the property is rezoned the use would become conforming again and the existing single detached house could be enlarged.

A Public Hearing in general accordance with the Municipal Government Act and the City's Procedure Bylaw, and consideration of the Second/Third Readings of proposed Bylaw #4439 will be held in the City Hall Council Chambers at the address below on Tuesday, August 8, 2017, beginning at approximately 6:30 pm. Any person who claims to be affected by the proposed bylaw may make representation to City Council at the Public Hearing. Oral submissions are limited to five minutes.

A copy of proposed Bylaw #4439 and related documents may be inspected during office hours (8:30 am to 4:30 pm) at the City Clerk Department or accessed via the 'Proposed Bylaws' section on the City's website at www.medicinehat.ca.

Anyone wishing to have a written submission concerning this proposed bylaw placed before the City Council must submit it to: City Clerk Department, 580 First Street SE, Medicine Hat, Alberta T1A 8E6 by 12:00 noon, Wednesday, July 26, 2017.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING & FIRE HYDRANT INSPECTIONS

Environmental Utilities performs regular, routine maintenance to uphold the water quality and system infrastructure by annually flushing water mains and inspecting fire hydrants.

During these operations, there may be some discoloration in the water which is not harmful to consume and will disappear when flushing is complete. Please note that discoloured water should not be used for laundry and that fluctuating water pressure may also be noticed.

Should discoloration persist beyond three hours, turn on your cold water tap or an outside sprinkler and let the water run for several minutes until the water runs clear.
