

## Price hopes to return Saturday against Sabres

Montreal Canadiens goaltender Carey Price is expecting to return to action Saturday against the visiting Buffalo Sabres.

Price, who has missed 10 games with a lower-body injury, said Friday that he's ready to play.

"It's just about getting timing back and getting into the groove again," Price said.

Price suffered an injury during the warmup before a Nov. 2 game against Minnesota but still played in a 6-3 loss to the Wild. He has a 3-7-1 mark this season with a 3.77 goals-against average and an .877 save percentage.

The Canadiens assigned goaltender Charlie Lindgren to AHL Laval on Friday. He posted a 3-4-1 record in eight games this season.

Entering Friday's games, Montreal (8-12-3) was third-last in the Eastern Conference standings with 19 points.

Seguin broke a tie with an unassisted goal, the 200th goal of his career, with 5:57 to play and added an empty-net goal with a minute to go.

After a turnover by Calgary's Michael Stone, Seguin took the puck down the slot and sent a wrist shot past goalie Mike Smith into the upper right corner of the net for the winner.

Sean Monahan's second goal of the game gave Calgary a 4-3 lead 6 minutes into the third period.

Dallas' Gemel Smith tied it at 4 at 12:12.

## Slumping teams overshadow latest showdown between Eichel and McDavid

BUFFALO, N.Y. Jack Eichel sat at his locker lamenting how the slumping Buffalo Sabres must stop making excuses for what's gone wrong.

"I think we should stop feeling sorry for ourselves," Eichel said of a team that was 0-5-2 in its previous seven games before hosting Edmonton on Friday night. "We just need to come together and work harder."

Down the hall, Oilers captain Connor McDavid had difficulty finding anything good to say about Edmonton's dreadful start.

"Positives?" McDavid said, incredulously, as teammate Patrick Maroon broke into a laugh next to him. "I mean, we haven't been very good this year, I think everyone's made that very clear. When I think positives? Whew. I don't know."

Whatever hype McDavid and Eichel generated in their previous matchups since being selected first and second respectively in the 2015 draft has been overshadowed by two franchises reverting to their losing ways a little over a quarter into the season.

The slow starts also come on the heels of the two making off-season headlines by signing lucrative contract extensions to cement their roles as franchise players.

McDavid, the NHL's MVP last season, signed an eight-year \$100 million deal that will make him the league's highest-paid player on a per-year basis. Eichel signed an eight-year, \$80 million deal, which is tied for the 10th-richest contract in league history.

None of that money, which kicks in next year for both players, has made a dent.

The Sabres (5-13-4) sit last in the Eastern Conference standings, and 30th overall, while already in jeopardy of extending their franchise-worst playoff drought to a seventh season.

The Oilers (8-12-2) sit 14th in the West, and 29th overall, while showing few signs of a team that a year ago snapped a 10-year playoff drought while posting its first 100-point season since its Wayne Gretzky heydays of the 1980s.

Edmonton has taken a most notable step back. The Oilers opened 1-4 and have won consecutive games just once this year, with the past five games reflecting their yo-yoing inconsistencies.

### PROTECT WATER LINES FROM FREEZING

The following actions should be considered to protect your water lines:

- Repair broken windows and ensure windows/vents are closed during the winter.
- Insulate water pipes in unheated areas, including crawl spaces.
- For sinks located against a non-insulated outside wall:
  - Open the vanity door to allow warm air to reach the water pipes.
  - A light bulb placed near the water pipe may generate enough heat to keep the water flowing
  - Heat tape wrapped around the pipe may keep the pipe from freezing.
- Residents of mobile homes should check the condition of the heat tape on their water service and water meter.
- Protect unheated indoor water meter with an insulated box and water pipes should be wrapped in insulation using heat tape.
- Outside water taps and underground sprinkler systems should have the water supply shut off inside the house at the isolation valve for the tap.
- Sprinkler lines and taps should be drained/blown out.
- A thin stream of water (as thick as a pencil lead) running continuously from at least one tap will help prevent a frozen water service.
- If you plan to be away from home over the winter period, close the main water isolation valve located next to the water meter in your home. You should leave the heat on in your home and have someone check inside your home daily while you're away.

A frozen water service, or a burst water pipe, is an inconvenience and expense that most people would like to avoid. Please take all possible precautions to prevent this happening in your home or business.

## Canada's Jane Channell wins World Cup silver in women's skeleton

Jane Channell knows the track at the Whistler Sliding Centre better than most of her competitors, but she was doubting herself going into Friday's World Cup skeleton race.

So when she ended up on the podium with a silver medal at her home course, she couldn't hold back the tears.

The 29-year-old from North Vancouver, B.C., managed to defend the second-place ranking she earned in the first heat, securing her podium finish with a speedy two-run time of one minute 48.61 seconds.

"I didn't have much confidence, honestly, going into today, even though I know it's my home track," said Channell. "I knew I could do it and everything, but it's just a matter of actually being able to execute it. Being here for selection races at the beginning of the year was so helpful and to be able to come back and build off of what I was able to do in September was huge. I'm really happy with how today went."

It was the first World Cup medal of the season for Channell, as well as her first at the Whistler Sliding Centre. The result was Channell's best since she won a silver and bronze during the 2015-2016 season.

With the Pyeongchang Winter Olympics on the horizon, winning the silver after a disappointing 2016-17 season "means so much" for Channell.

"Especially at home, my home track, my very first track," she added. "It means the world to me."
