

Canada's Schnur posts another upset at N.Y. Open

UNIONDALE, N.Y. Canadian qualifier Brayden Schnur has made an improbable run to the semifinals at the ATP Tour's New York Open. Schnur, ranked 154th in the world, beat Italy's Paolo Lorenzi 6-7 (7), 7-6 (5), 7-5 on Friday in a quarterfinal at the ATP 250 event. The 23-year-old native of Pickering, Ont., who had never won a main tour match before this week, how now triumphed in five straight matches — two in qualifying and three in the main draw. The biggest win was a three-set triumph over world No. 34 Steve Johnson of the U.S., in the second round. Schnur is projected to go up to around No. 120 in the world if he loses in the semifinals. Against Lorenzi, Schnur out-aced his opponent 24-6. He fought off all three break points for Lorenzi and recorded the decisive break late in the third set to take a 6-5 lead.

Shapovalov ousted at Rotterdam

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands Canada's Denis Shapovalov was eliminated in the quarterfinals of the ABN AMRO World Tennis Tournament on Friday, losing 6-4, 7-6 (4) to Switzerland's Stan Wawrinka. Serving for the win on double match point, Wawrinka sealed up the victory when a Shapovalov return went long. Wawrinka's advantage came from converting three of the eight break points he had. His serve wasn't overly accurate, landing just 50 per cent of his first serves. But he took 78 per cent of points when his first serve was good, and won on 59 per cent of second serves. Wawrinka also did not have a double fault. Shapovalov, from Richmond Hill, Ont., didn't help his cause with 34 unforced errors and seven double faults. But the 10th seed and world No. 25 did show

glimpses of brilliance, including coming back from down two breaks to force a second-set tiebreaker. He converted both of his break-point opportunities, with both coming in the second set. The players each had three aces. Wawrinka advanced to the quarterfinals of the ATP 500 hardcourt tournament with a 6-4, 7-6 (4) win over fourth seed Milos Raonic of Thornhill, Ont. Wawrinka entered the tournament ranked 68th in the world. But the Swiss veteran is a former world No. 3 and a three-time Grand Slam champion who is finding his form after a couple of injury-plagued seasons. The victory tied the series between the players at a win apiece. Shapovalov defeated Wawrinka at a hardcourt tournament last year in Tokyo. Wawrinka will play either Japan's Kei Nishikori or Marton Fucsovics of Hungary in the semifinals.

Ottawa, provincial governments commit to addressing abuse in sports

Canadian politicians are banding together to address harassment, abuse and discrimination in sports, but details on their plans remain slim.

Kirsty Duncan, Canada's Minister of Science and Sport, announced in Red Deer on Friday that the federal government, along with each province and territory, has signed a declaration to tackle and prevent harassment, abuse and dis-

crimination in sport. "This pan-Canadian declaration will drive a systemic culture shift to prevent abuse, discrimination and harassment in sport," she told reporters following a meeting with federal, provincial and territorial repre-

sentatives ahead of the 2019 Canada Winter Games. "Athletes must be at the centre of everything that we do. They have a voice and we must listen. They are not commodities, they are people and they need to be respected."

The move brings various levels of government together on the issue and will drive action going forward, ensuring there are policies in place to address abuse, and concrete measures are implemented to prevent it, Duncan said.

PROTECT WATER LINES FROM FREEZING

The following actions should be considered to protect your water lines:

- Repair broken windows and ensure windows/vents are closed during the winter.
- Insulate water pipes in unheated areas, including crawl spaces.
- For sinks located against a non-insulated outside wall:
 - Open the vanity door to allow warm air to reach the water pipes.
 - A light bulb placed near the water pipe may generate enough heat to keep the water flowing.
 - Heat tape wrapped around the pipe may keep the pipe from freezing.
- Residents of mobile homes should check the condition of the heat tape on their water service and water meter.
- Protect unheated indoor water meter with an insulated box and water pipes should be wrapped in insulation using heat tape.
- Outside water taps and underground sprinkler systems should have the water supply shut off inside the house at the isolation valve for the tap.
- Sprinkler lines and taps should be drained/blown out.
- A thin stream of water (as thick as a pencil lead) running continuously from at least one tap will help prevent a frozen water service.
- If you plan to be away from home over the winter period, close the main water isolation valve located next to the water meter in your home. You should leave the heat on in your home and have someone check inside your home daily while you're away.

A frozen water service, or a burst water pipe, is an inconvenience and expense that most people would like to avoid. Please take all possible precautions to prevent this happening in your home or business.

CART COLLECTION TIPS

- Carts must be out by 7 a.m. on your collection day.
- Waste carts are collected separately with collection times that vary throughout the day.
- Make sure carts are accessible with 3ft (1m) clearance on all sides.
- Ensure cart lids are closed to avoid litter or collection problems.
- Avoid placing carts on or behind snowbanks.
- Contaminated blue recycling carts will not be collected.

To prevent theft or damage to your cart; remove carts off roadways, sidewalks, back lanes etc. and return to private property within 24 hours of collection.
