

Monahan sets new career best

CALGARY
Sean Monahan scored twice to set a new career high in goals and also added two assists, leading the Calgary Flames to a 6-1 win over the Anaheim Ducks on Friday.

Monahan entered the night with two goals in his last 19 games, but he broke out with a big game offensively and is up to 33 on the year — surpassing his previous career best of 31 goals.

Mark Giordano, James Neal, Derek Ryan and Garnet Hathaway also scored for Calgary.

Seeking their first division title since 2005-06 and first conference title since 1989-90, the Flames extended their lead atop the Pacific Division and Western Conference to eight points over San Jose. The Sharks have five games remaining including a home date with Calgary on Sunday.

Andy Welinski, with his first NHL goal, scored for Anaheim. The injury-ravaged Ducks are already eliminated from play-off contention.

PITTSBURGH — Pekka Rinne stopped 42 shots to lead the Nashville Predators to a

victory over the Pittsburgh Penguins.

Rinne was 63 seconds from his fifth shutout of the season when Nick Bjugstad scored for Pittsburgh.

Viktor Arvidsson's 32nd goal of the season — a power-play goal — set a career high and also was the 100th of his NHL career. Craig Smith and P.K. Subban also scored for the Predators, who moved into a first-place tie in the Central Division.

Aggressive running helps Jays

TORONTO

As Toronto Blue Jays shortstop Freddy Galvis rounded first he had his eyes locked on the glove of Detroit Tigers centre-fielder Mikie Mahtook. When Galvis saw the ball bounce out of Mahtook's hand, he knew he had to push his hit to the limit.

Galvis rounded second and then slid into third to clear the bases and give the Blue Jays a four-run lead as Toronto beat Detroit 6-0 on Friday night. Turning that single into what was effectively a triple

cashed in Justin Smoak, Teoscar Hernandez and Billy McKinney.

"I saw (third base coach Luis Rivera) send in the guys home, that's when I decided to go to third base," said Galvis, who finished the day with two hits, three RBIs, and a run. "I prefer making the fielders get me out and let the runs score."

Rookie manager Charlie Montoyo was pleased that Rivera gave the green light to all four runners with two out.

"The third base coach deserves a lot of credit," said Montoyo. "They never get credit, that was an outstanding send by Luis Rivera. That was very good."

It was Montoyo's first win as a manager in Major League Baseball. Montoyo told reporters that he was freezing after his players dragged him into the bathroom to shower him with beer, shampoo and buckets of ice water after the victory.

"Oh man, it was great," said starting pitcher Matt Shoemaker. "Charlie comes in, first

big-league win, we threw him in the shower, gave him a nice cold shower. It was great.

"He needed a cold one. He got about 50, 60 cold ones all at the same time. It was awesome."

Montoyo made his MLB managerial debut on Thursday after 22 years in the Tampa Bay Rays organization. He earned a 1,266-1,142 record over 18 seasons as a manager in the minors.

"I can retire now, I've got a win at every level," said Montoyo, through chattering teeth.

Hernandez had an RBI single earlier in the fourth for the Blue Jays (1-1), and Smoak had a two-run single of his own in the sixth.

Shoemaker (1-0) pitched seven scoreless innings, giving up just two hits and striking out seven. Javy Guerra pitched two scoreless innings of relief to back Shoemaker's solid performance.

Matthew Boyd (0-1) looked dominant for Detroit (1-1) in the first three innings, but gave up four runs — three earned — in the fourth.

He struck out 10 over five innings, reaching double digits in Ks for the second time in his career. Boyd had 11 on Sept. 8 against St. Louis.

Buck Farmer, Blaine Hardy and Reed Garrett all came out of the bullpen for the Tigers, with Hardy giving up two more runs.

Brandon Drury led off the first inning for the Blue Jays with a triple to deep left field. Boyd bore down and struck out the next three batters to end the inning, stranding Drury.

BYLAW #4503 PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE LAND USE BYLAW #4168

201 2 Street NW (Former Riverside School Site) and Riverside Area Redevelopment Plan Overlay

Postponement of Public Hearing to April 15, 2019

TAKE NOTICE that City Council gave First Reading on Tuesday, February 19, 2019 to Bylaw #4503, a Bylaw of the City of Medicine Hat to amend the Land Use Bylaw #4168. The purpose of Bylaw #4503 is to implement policies from the Riverside Area Redevelopment Plan. This includes two components: the rezoning of the former Riverside School site to Direct Control (DC) and the adoption of a Riverside Area Redevelopment Plan Overlay.

A Public Hearing in general accordance with the Municipal Government Act and the City's Procedure Bylaw, and consideration of the Second/Third Readings of proposed Bylaw #4503 scheduled to be considered at the Monday, March 18, 2019 Regular City Council Meeting has been postponed. A continuation of the Public Hearing will be held in the City Hall Council Chambers at the address below on Monday, **April 15, 2019**, beginning at approximately 6:30 pm. Any person who claims to be affected by the proposed bylaw may make representation to City Council at the Public Hearing. Oral submissions are limited to five minutes.

PROTECT WATER LINES FROM FREEZING

The following actions should be considered to protect your water lines:

- Repair broken windows and ensure windows/vents are closed during the winter.
- Insulate water pipes in unheated areas, including crawl spaces.
- For sinks located against a non-insulated outside wall:
 - Open the vanity door to allow warm air to reach the water pipes.
 - A light bulb placed near the water pipe may generate enough heat to keep the water flowing.
 - Heat tape wrapped around the pipe may keep the pipe from freezing.
- Residents of mobile homes should check the condition of the heat tape on their water service and water meter.
- Protect unheated indoor water meter with an insulated box and water pipes should be wrapped in insulation using heat tape.
- Outside water taps and underground sprinkler systems should have the water supply shut off inside the house at the isolation valve for the tap.
- Sprinkler lines and taps should be drained/blown out.
- A thin stream of water (as thick as a pencil lead) running continuously from at least one tap will help prevent a frozen water service.
- If you plan to be away from home over the winter period, close the main water isolation valve located next to the water meter in your home. You should leave the heat on in your home and have someone check inside your home daily while you're away.

A frozen water service, or a burst water pipe, is an inconvenience and expense that most people would like to avoid. Please take all possible precautions to prevent this happening in your home or business.
