Projected high draft pick leads Finland to win over Canada

KOSICE, Slovakia
Finland continued its recent domination of Canada in international hockey on Friday, winning 3-1 in the opening game for both teams at the world men's championship.

The Finns beat the Canadians in the preliminary round at the same tournament last year and also eliminated Canada from gold-medal contention at the world juniors and world women's championships this year.

Finland's Kaapo Kakko, expected to be a high pick in the NHL draft next month in Vancouver, led the way with two goals on Friday.

Arttu Ilomaki scored the winner for Finland on the power play, depositing a rebound behind Canadian goalie Matt Murray early in the third period.

missed a great chance with goalie Matt Murray pulled late in regulation. He was all alone in front, but his backhand was stopped by Finland goalie Kevin Lankinen.

Kakko sealed it with an empty-netter seconds later.

"I thought we were on our heels in the first period. We got much better in the second, I

really liked our second period, but then (Finland) got that bounce (that lead to a goal) at the beginning of the third and it put us back a little bit," Canada head coach Alain Vigneault said.

"I think we could have responded a little better, but give (Finland) credit, they played a good game."

Whalers fans still cheering 22 years after team's move

HARTFORD, Conn.

For Mark Anderson, the opening game between the Carolina Hurricanes and the Boston Bruins was a trip down memory lane.

Anderson was watching Game 1 closely at a gathering in suburban Hartford Thursday night as the Bruins rallied to beat the Hurricanes 5-2 behind four goals in the third period.

"Look at that," Anderson said after Patrice Bergeron's goal put Boston ahead for good. "It's just like old times. Two b.s. penalties against us lead to two b.s. Bruins goals."

If Anderson sounds like a Hurricanes fan, you're not far off the mark. He is in fact a Hartford Whalers fan and was one of several members of the Hartford Whalers Booster Club (yes, it still exists) who watched the game at a Buffalo Wild Wings restaurant in Manchester.

Twenty-two years after Hartford's only major professional franchise left the city for Raleigh, North Carolina, the bittersweet love of the Whalers is still going strong for some.

The 44-year-old Anderson and the others could not resist getting together as the franchise that left them faced their former New England rival.



Most said they were rooting for the Hurricanes, even if it caused them to spit up in their mouths just a little bit.

"I've always said that no matter what, I'd never root for

the Bruins and never root for the Rangers," said Dan Narvesen, 40, who came from some 25 miles away in Granby to watch with the club. "So, this would be one of the few times that I will root for Carolina."

"And, whether it was for a money grab or not, the new owner did bring back the Whalers jerseys for a couple games this year, so at least they are finally acknowledging the past," he added.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING & FIRE HYDRANT INSPECTIONS

Environmental Utilities performs regular, routine maintenance to uphold the water quality and system infrastructure by annually flushing water mains and inspecting fire hydrants.

During these operations, there may be some discoloration in the water which is not harmful to consume and will disappear when flushing is complete. Please note that discoloured water should not be used for laundry and that fluctuating water pressure may also be noticed.

Should discoloration persist beyond three hours, turn on your cold water tap or an outside sprinkler and let the water run for several minutes until the water runs clear.

Red Kelly remembered

Family, friends and the hockey world bid farewell to Red Kelly at the NHL great's funeral on Friday.

The eight-time Stanley Cup champion, who played 20 seasons with the Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs, died last week at age 91.

Leonard Patrick Kelly started his hockey career as a defenceman, but switched to centre after getting traded to Toronto.

Inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1969, Kelly was elected as a member of Parliament in Toronto twice in the 1960s while he was playing for the Leafs and was a member of the franchise's last team to raise the Stanley Cup in 1967. The native of Simcoe, Ont., died on May 2 — exactly 52 years to the day of that victory.

Honorary pallbearers at the funeral included Frank Mahovlich, Darryl Sittler, Lanny McDonald, Bob Baun, Dick Duff, Ron Ellis, Dave Keon, Eddie Shack and Jim Gregory. Leafs president Brendan Shanahan, general manager Kyle Dubas, Detroit GM Steve Yzerman, NHL commissioner Gary Bettman and former Toronto captain Wendel Clark were also in attendance.

Marchand mostly staying out of trouble

There's a dust-up in the corner, the referee raises his arm to signal a penalty, and Brad Marchand is right in the middle of it.

Only this time, he's trying to keep the peace.

The face-licking, stick-stomping Bruins forward moved quickly to pull rookie Connor Clifton away before he could retaliate for an illegal hit by Carolina's Jordan Staal. Instead of matching minors, Boston wound up with a power play that led to the tying goal, and the Bruins went on to beat the Hurricanes 5-2 in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference finals.

"He's turning over a new leaf, eh?" Bruins coach Bruce Cassidy said with a smile after the Bruins moved three wins from returning to the Stanley Cup Final for the first time since 2013.

A 5-foot-9 gadfly nicknamed "The Little Ball of Hate," Marchand is a two-time All-Star who helped Boston lift the Cup as a rookie in 2011 and scored 100 points this season for the first time. He leads all players with 15 points this post-season.

But his antics have angered other teams and sometimes overshadowed his skills.

During last year's post-season, he developed a tendency to lick opponents' faces; the NHL told him to knock it off. This year, even Cassidy has praised him for the maturity that has kept that behaviour to a minimum; Marchand was caught stomping on Blue Jackets' forward Cam Atkinson's stick before a faceoff.

Later in the series, he sucker-punched Columbus' Scott Harrington from behind. More important for the Bruins, after going scoreless in the first three games of the East semifinals, Marchand had a goal and three assists over the next two to help them rally from a 2-1 deficit and win the series in six.

"Listen, he's been in these big games," Cassidy said. "He's a Stanley Cup champion. So he understands maybe a little more than meets the eye sometimes."
