

Coco Gauff, 15, still unbeaten at Wimbledon

It was easy to forget that Coco Gauff is still just 15 as she stood on the grass of Centre Court, pounding her chest and shouting, "Let's go! Come on!" to celebrate a 32-stroke point that forced a third set in her match Friday at Wimbledon.

Up in the stands, Mom rose to pump a fist and yell, "Yes!" By then, Gauff already twice had been a point from losing to Polona Hercog of Slovenia.

That Gauff, ranked 313th and facing another unseeded player, was scheduled to appear at Wimbledon's main stadium says plenty about what a sensation the Floridian already is. That she won, and how she did — erasing a pair of match points and coming back to beat Hercog 3-6, 7-6 (7), 7-5 — offer some insight into what Gauff might become.

Raonic moves on at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England Milos Raonic is off to the round of 16 at Wimbledon for the fifth time in his career, but he won't be joined by fellow Canadian Felix Auger-Aliassime.

Raonic, the No. 15 seed from Thornhill, Ont., is the lone Canadian left in either singles draw at the Grand Slam after Montreal's Auger-Aliassime lost 6-4, 7-5, 6-3 to Ugo Humbert of France in the third round on Friday.

Earlier, Raonic defeated American Reilly Opelka 7-6 (1), 6-2, 6-1.

Nineteenth-seeded Auger-Aliassime recorded his first two career Grand Slam victories this tournament, but the 18-year-old from Montreal fell short of setting up a fourth-round showdown against world No. 1 Novak Djokovic.

"Pressure got to me. ... It got to a point where it was a bit embarrassing," Auger-Aliassime said. "It was just tough. I just wasn't finding ways. I think he just did what he had to do. He was solid.

From my end, it was pretty embarrassing."

Auger-Aliassime had 24 winners and 32 unforced errors. The 21-year-old Humbert, ranked 66th in the world, had 22 of each.

Two Canadian men never have advanced to the round of 16 in a Grand Slam in the same year.

Raonic, meanwhile, was happy with his performance.

"I thought it was good. I did the things I wanted to do," Raonic said. "You know, when it was important, I played as well as I could have."

Raonic, the 2016

Wimbledon runner-up, hasn't lost a set this tournament. He'll face No. 26 seed Guido Pella in the fourth round after the Argentine veteran upset No. 4 Kevin Anderson of South Africa 6-4, 6-3, 7-6 (4).

Pella, 29, and Raonic, 28, never have faced each other.

Pella is in the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time.

"It's going to be tough," Raonic said.

"He played well here last year, beating Marin (Cilic), obviously getting a good win

today, and even in his last match over (Andreas) Seppi who has always played well on grass. He's been on tour for a long time, and I don't know if he's been to this stage of a Grand Slam. But ... to beat Kevin (Anderson) here, that's a job very well done."



Milos Raonic

In a matchup of big servers on Friday, Raonic broke Opelka twice in each of the last two sets. Both players finished with 13 aces each but Raonic had only seven unforced errors to Opelka's 31.

The six-foot-11 Opelka was making his Wimbledon debut and knocked out three-time Grand Slam champion Stan Wawrinka of Switzerland in the second round.

In women's doubles second-round play, the fourth-seeded team of Ottawa's Gabriela Dabrowski and China's Yifan Xu beat Kateryna Kozlova of Ukraine and Arina Rodionova of Australia 6-2, 6-1.

In men's doubles second-round action, Vancouver's Vasek Pospisil and Australia's Matthew Ebden lost 7-5, 6-4, 7-6 (3) to Joe Salisbury of Great Britain and Rajeev Ram of the U.S.

New generation ready to deliver at Tour de France

BRUSSELS

No matter who wins, this year's Tour de France will see a changing of the guard.

And if the names of Wout Van Aert, Kasper Asgreen, Enric Mas or Caleb Ewan don't ring a bell now, they might soon be on everybody's lips.

In the absence of many stalwart riders who have stamped their mark on cycling's marquee event in recent years, new faces will emerge this summer.

There is a long list of top riders missing the Tour, which starts on Saturday from Brussels with a 194.5 kilometre (120.8-mile) stage through Flanders and back to the Belgian capital, and that number includes:

— Four-time champion Chris Froome, who is missing out for the first time since 2011.

— 2018 runner-up Tom Dumoulin.

— Primož Roglič, a fourth-place finisher last year.

— Former world champion Philippe Gilbert.

— Ace sprinters Mark Cavendish, Marcel Kittel and Fernando Gaviria.

The generational change is likely to be the most visible in the fight for the race leader's yellow jersey, as 22-year-old Egan Bernal seems ready to take over from his leader at team Ineos, defending champion Graint Thomas.

In the wake of an already successful season during which he won the Paris-Nice and Tour de Suisse weeklong races, Bernal has been elevated to a co-leader status after Froome, who also rides for Ineos, was ruled out because of a horrific crash last month.

Despite his lack of experience — he will start his second Grand Tour — Bernal is showing an impressive maturity.

"I think you have a physical age and a mental age, but when you're ready, you're ready," Ineos team boss Dave Brailsford said on Friday. "He's ready."

Many former Tour winners including Eddy Merckx and Alberto Contador have picked Bernal as their favourite to win a race that features several grueling mountainous stages this year. They expect the diminutive Colombian climber to grab the spotlight when the Tour reaches the high-altitude summits in the last 10 days of racing.

Before that, there will be many opportunities for the 33 riders making their first Tour appearance to show off their skills and challenge the supremacy of their elders — starting Saturday.

Penguins sign coach Mike Sullivan to 4-year extension

Mike Sullivan is sticking around to see if he can get the Pittsburgh Penguins back to the Stanley Cup.

The club announced Friday that it has signed Sullivan — who guided the Penguins to championships in 2016 and 2017 — to a four-contract extension that runs through the 2023-24 season. The terms of the new deal will kick in when Sullivan's current contract expires at the end of the upcoming season.

The 51-year-old Sullivan is 174-92-34 with Pittsburgh since taking over for Mike Johnston in December 2015. Sullivan's arrival provided a spark that helped the Penguins become the first team in nearly two decades to repeat as Stanley Cup champions. The deal gives Sullivan time to help Pittsburgh retool after getting swept by the New York Islanders in the first round of the 2019 playoffs.

"Mike has done a great job delivering four, 100-plus point seasons with our team," general manager Jim Rutherford said in a statement. "To win back-to-back Stanley Cups in this era speaks volumes of him as a coach."

The extension doubles as a vote of confidence from Rutherford, who expressed concern about the need for a culture change inside the dressing room after the Penguins slogged through much of 2018-19 before the earliest playoff exit of the Sidney Crosby era.

GAS, ELECTRIC, WIND ENERGY RATES SET FOR JULY

Medicine Hat – The City of Medicine Hat has set its July energy commodity rates.

Natural Gas

The July natural gas commodity rate of \$0.2945 per gigajoule (GJ), down from the previous month of \$1.4730 per GJ, for all customers is based on the average of the monthly gas charges set by Alberta gas distribution (pipes) owners.

The City of Medicine Hat calculates the Monthly Reference Price based on the average of the rates approved by the Alberta Utilities Commission.

Electricity

The July electricity rate of \$0.06800 per kilowatt hour, up from the previous month of \$0.06771 per kilowatt hour, for Residential, Farm, Small and Medium Commercial, Unmetered Services and Rental Lighting, is based on the average of the rates for owners whose regulated rate tariffs are approved by the Alberta Utilities Commission under section 103(2) of the Electric Utilities Act for that calendar month as posted by the Alberta Utilities Commission on its internet page under Regulated Rate Option Regulation.

In November 2016 the Government of Alberta announced a plan to cap the Regulated Rate Option at 6.8 cents per kilowatt hour. City of Medicine Hat electric utility customers are protected under Ministerial Order 149/2017. During the period of January 1, 2018 – May 31, 2021 Residential, Farm, Small and Medium Commercial, Unmetered Services and Rental Lighting customers will pay the lower of the Market Reference Price or the rate ceiling of 6.8 cents per kilowatt hour. The rate will automatically be applied to consumer's bills that are on the regulated rate.

The City of Medicine Hat calculates the Monthly Reference Price based on the average of the rates using the four Regulated Rate Option providers approved by the Alberta Utilities Commission under section 103(2) of the Electric Utilities Act. This calculation aligns with the Regulated Rate Cap Regulation.

The July default electricity rate for Large Commercial, Industrial and Street Lighting customers is based on the monthly average Alberta Power Pool price as established and published by the Alberta Electric System Operator (AESO) plus \$0.02 per kilowatt hour. The rate for June was \$0.07352 per kilowatt hour.

The Electric Utility also offers a fixed electric commodity price for Residential, Farm, Small and Medium Commercial customers. The fixed rate for 2019 is \$0.06800 per kilowatt hour.

The Gas Utility offers a fixed natural gas commodity price for all rate class customers. The fixed rate for 2019 is \$5.80 per GJ.

Going Green Charge

Customers also have a "Going Green" surcharge on their bill. This surcharge is for renewable energy purchased for residential, farm, small and medium commercial customers.

The Going Green surcharge is calculated monthly to recover costs incurred to purchase renewable energy.

The Going Green surcharge for July is \$0.0030 per kilowatt hour.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING & FIRE HYDRANT INSPECTIONS

Environmental Utilities performs regular, routine maintenance to uphold the water quality and system infrastructure by annually flushing water mains and inspecting fire hydrants.

During these operations, there may be some discoloration in the water which is not harmful to consume and will disappear when flushing is complete. Please note that discoloured water should not be used for laundry and that fluctuating water pressure may also be noticed.

Should discoloration persist beyond three hours, turn on your cold water tap or an outside sprinkler and let the water run for several minutes until the water runs clear.
