

Third-stringer Robert Marve could be Winnipeg's quarterback of the present

Robert Marve is feeling more pumped now that he's not on borrowed time.

Blue Bombers head coach Mike O'Shea said this week the former third-string quarterback will get his second pro start when Calgary visits on Saturday — and be the guy for the foreseeable future.

"It's nice when you hear that from the boss man," Marve said Friday after the team's walk-through practice.

"But more than anything, I've been here for a year and a half. I want to play well for my teammates, I want to play well for the city and getting some

wins can get some movement going towards the playoffs."

Marve is replacing starter Drew Willy, who suffered a serious knee injury Aug. 9 and is out six to eight weeks. O'Shea gave Marve his first start the following week over backup Brian Brohm, but the debut was a 27-20 home loss to Toronto.

The Bombers (3-5) take on the Stampeders having lost two in a row and four of their last five games.

The Stampeders (6-2) are on a three-game win streak and lead the CFL West Division.

Winnipeg is coming off a bye week and Marve, 26, stayed in the city to go over film and the playbook with the coaches.

Eskis double up on Argos

Rookie quarterback James Franklin threw one touchdown and ran in another as the Edmonton Eskimos beat the Toronto Argonauts 38-15 on Friday.

The win moved the Eskimos (6-3) back into a first-place in the CFL's West Division with the Calgary Stampeders. Edmonton was coming off a 49-20 loss to the Hamilton Tiger-Cats last week.

Toronto saw a three-game winning streak snapped and fell to 6-3 on the season. Franklin, making his first career start in

place of Matt Nichols, engineered a 92-yard opening drive before capping it off by eluding a tackle and scrambling 18 yards into the end zone for an early 7-0 lead.

Franklin hit Derel Walker with a 53-yard pass, setting up a 23-yard Grant Shaw field goal on Edmonton's second drive.

Toronto got on the scoreboard midway through the second quarter, getting a single on a missed Swayze Waters field goal attempt.

The Eskimos responded with a punt single.

The Argos put together a late drive culminating in a one-yard TD plunge by backup quarterback Adrian McPherson to make it 11-8 at the half.

Roughriders look for first win against Redblacks

OTTAWA
The changes keep coming for the Redblacks, with running back Chevon Walker being the latest casualty.

Walker was the third player released this week following defensive back Brandon McDonald, Ottawa's leading tackler, and punter Andy Wilder.

Walker was a popular player, but 28-year-old's productivity was below management's expectations. Walker had 78 carries for 287 yards this season, averaging 3.7 yards per attempt and no touchdowns.

The Redblacks believe Jeremiah Johnson will prove to be more productive in the role and see potential in some of their other running backs.

Johnson won't have to wait long to prove his worth as the 4-4 Redblacks host the winless Saskatchewan Roughriders (0-8) Sunday afternoon at TD Place. He says he's looking forward to getting more opportunity, but was sad to see good friend Walker go.

"This business is something you know you're going to have quick friends and then you're going to have long friends and that's why you have to come out here with the intention of putting your best foot forward every single time, every single time you step on that field even in practice and even in a game."

Johnson has just 30 carries for 86 rushing yards and 13 catches for 84 receiving yards this season, but has scored three touchdowns, including two last week against Toronto.

Newfoundland teen aims to be a two-sport Paralympian

Within days of rolling off the basketball court in Toronto with a silver medal around his neck, Liam Hickey was gliding onto the ice on his sledge in Calgary.

It's been a big summer for the 17-year-old from St. John's, N.L. In the last two weeks, Hickey has taken significant steps towards his goal of becoming a two-sport Paralympian for Canada.

The Parapan Am Games in Toronto were Hickey's first major international tournament with the Canadian men's wheelchair basketball team. Canada fell 62-39 to the United States in the final and settled for a silver medal Aug. 15 at the Mattamy Athletic Centre.

Their semifinal win over Brazil, however, qualified the Canadian men for next summer's Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. Canada is the defending champion and has won three of the last four Paralympic gold medals.

Just over a week after the Parapan Am basketball final, Hickey reported to the national sledge hockey team's development camp in Calgary.

"I want to go to the highest level of each sport," Hickey said after a sledge session in Calgary this week.

"I'm going to do my best to try and make Rio, still focusing on both sports and then hopefully make the team for the next Paralympics for sledge hockey."
