Description of Historic Place

The Cousins Block is situated mid-block on 6 Avenue SE between 3 and 4 Streets SE in Medicine Hat's downtown commercial core. The two-storey brick commercial building possesses minimal setback from the street and is located adjacent and connected to other commercial buildings. The building is characterized by its stepped parapet with horizontal banding and central arch, quoining, and later added substantial storefront canopy.

Heritage Value of Historic Place

The Cousins Block, built in 1911, is valued as a component of Medicine Hat's pre-First World War downtown development. Medicine Hat's first downtown expansion had started in 1883 with the arrival of the railway. The initial settlement and growth of Medicine Hat was based around the positioning of the railway yard and station, and early commercial buildings were constructed along North and South Railway and adjacent streets. A second wave of downtown development occurred in the pre-First World War period. The Cousins Block represents this later period of economic prosperity during the early 1910s, which extended the downtown commercial core westward. The block's main floor could accommodate two tenants. An initial tenant was the Imperial Bank of Canada, which temporarily occupied one of the units immediately after the Cousins Block was finished. Another early, and long-term, business to occupy one of the Cousins Block's units was the financial brokers and real estate firm of Duggan & Duggan. The


firm previously occupied offices in the block built by William Cousins on 3 Street SE, before relocating in late 1911, to Cousin's newly finished block on 6 Avenue SE. Over its lifetime, the Cousins Block housed a wide range of businesses including an Oil & Stock Exchange, a grocery, a beauty salon, and its most recognized association, a bakery — City Bakery. City Bakery was the longest operating business to occupy the commercial block. Hans-Karl Leupold, who trained as a baker in Germany, and his wife, Martha (nee Meyer) opened City Bakery in 1960. Leupold immigrated to Canada in 1953, settling in Winnipeg, Manitoba, where he met and married Martha. Together they operated Leo's Home Bakery, until they moved to Medicine Hat in 1960. Following their arrival, they opened City Bakery in the Cousins Block, which they operated until 2004.

The Cousins Block is further valued for its connection with early Medicine Hat pioneer William Cousins, who owned and developed the commercial block. William Cousins arrived in Medicine Hat via a 'prairie schooner' in May of 1883 - just prior to the arrival of the railway. Originally from London, Ontario, Cousins travelled west in the early 1880s, settling first in Winnipeg in 1882. Recognizing the potential business opportunity of the burgeoning railway townsite, Cousins took the railway to Regina, purchased merchandise, horses and wagons, and travelled to Medicine Hat entering the then tent town via the South Saskatchewan Valley by way of Porter's Hill. He established his first business, a mercantile store, in a tent in what is now Riverside Park, providing goods and merchandise to railway workers and their families, as well as early settlers. The following year he married Jessie Thornton and settled at 271 First Street. A shrewd businessman, Cousins frequently sought out opportunities to expand his financial position, such as investing in ranching and real estate. He constructed the first "Cousins Block" a two-storey commercial block at present day 666 - 3 Street SE, in 1901. The block was only referred to as the "Cousins Block" for roughly 10 years and was torn down sometime prior to 1955.

William Cousins owned the entire lot that fronted onto 6 Avenue SE on which the extant "Cousins Block" was built in 1911. The lot also included the Dreamland Theatre (1910) and Union Bank (1912). He bought and sold the lot twice during his lifetime making a sizeable profit each time - a practice the astute businessman would repeat with numerous properties during Medicine Hat's early development. Cousins was also a civic-minded man, instrumental in the development of *The Medicine Hat News*, a founder of the Medicine Hat Agricultural Society, co-founder of the Cypress Club, member of the inaugural Hospital Board, member of the Board of Trade, Town Mayor, as well as the first Clerk of the Supreme Court of the North West Territories.

The Cousins Block holds further value as a representation of Medicine Hat's Edwardian era Classical Revival-style architecture. Designed by prominent local architect William T. Williams and built by M. Fulkan for \$5,000, the two-storey brick building reflects many of the characteristics of this architectural style, including its full-height storefront with wood cornice, stepped parapet, brick cornice with central arch, and brick quoining. The foundation of this architectural style is rooted in the period's increased understanding of Greek and Roman building construction, and the style is frequently found in buildings dating to the first decades of the 20th century.

Character-Defining Elements

The key elements that define the heritage character of Cousins Block include but are not limited to its:

- location mid-block on the west side of 6th Avenue SE in the commercial core of Medicine Hat, with minimal set back from the street;
- proximity to other commercial blocks of a similar age and construction;
- form, scale, and massing as expressed by its: two-storey height, rectangular form, flat roof with stepped parapet;
- masonry construction including: concrete foundation, pressed red brick with tooled grey mortar joints;
- Classical Revival-style details such as: simplicity of form; stepped parapet capped with parged brick; quoining; second storey cornice with arched banding; wood storefront cornice; and
- fenestration including the original second storey window openings.

	The Cousins Block possesses a fair degree of architectural integrity with elements of its original form still intact. The original red brick exterior is in good condition; however, the brick has been painted. The visible unpainted original brick does not exhibit signs of spalling or mortar loss. The storefront has been reconfigured and the original windows and door replaced. The later added storefront canopy obscures the original wood and tin storefront cornice. The second storey of the front façade resembles its original Edwardian era design. The windows of the second storey have been replaced; however, the openings are intact. The original window openings on the north side of the building have been filled in. The stepped parapet with its arched banding is intact and in good condition. A onestorey addition was placed on the rear of the building post-1955, and the interior of the building has been extensively renovated. The building's rear courtyard exhibits signs of pigeons roosting and steps should be taken to prevent the birds continuing to occupy this space and potentially attracting other pests.
